

From The Rector of Saint James Cathedral-Basilica

Dear parishioners and friends of Saint James,

This is Thanksgiving Week. You already know that I'm going to remind you to have gratitude, express it in some tangible way and be particularly mindful of those who go without. Yes, you know this. But when I read Saint Paul's exhortation to the Thessalonians who had be very concerned about the return of Christ seeming to be delayed, I am put on an alert that rather highlights the need to be thankful.

Paul tells them "For you yourselves know very well that the day of the Lord will come like a thief at night. When people are saying, "Peace and security", then sudden disaster comes upon them, like labor pains upon a pregnant woman, and they will not escape." How can we read this and not think of those people in Israel caught off-guard, at a music festival even, and who had their lives cut out from under them? How can we not think of those people in Gaza having their lives blasted away by bombs, a whole life here one day and gone another?

The context is the Lord's coming but life tends to change, even dramatically, suddenly and without warning. As of this writing, we have each other. We are gearing up for a liturgical renewal of our ministries, altar servers, lectors, Extraordinary Ministers of Holy Communion and ushers. We are preparing for Thanksgiving and the Christmas holidays planning special meals, special music and top-notch decorating. We can be thankful for our family and friends and even for relationships that haven't worked out yet or maybe have to wait for the 'other side' to iron out.

We have now. The future could be much different, so we ought to make the best of things and love each other as best we can. As the 'Daily Camino' for Thanksgiving reminds us . . . we may not have all those things we think we need to be happy but we have each other and can still stand tall.

Just be thankful for what you got in Jesus' Holy Name.
