

Dear parishioners and friends of Saint James.

Now that we have arrived at the First Sunday of Advent, I'm sure many of you already suspect what I am going to write, in fact, I could just leave an empty space and you could fill it in! However, knowing that I know that you know, I'll (kind of) spare you the usual. No rant about the Holiday Season beginning right after Labor Day, the abstract street 'decorations' depicting aspects of winter many would prefer to avoid or the commercialization of the commercialization of Christmas so that it hardly reflects at all the ancient intention of the season.

While I hear many pastors commenting on the continued poor attendance at Masses, I can say that even though we do have some Masses that I would have expected to be better attended, the participation of parishioners and interest in faith formation is steadily growing.

I will admit that I tend to have what is seen as an unreasonable expectation of knowledge and adherence to the Catholic faith. I am sure this is off-putting to some and just plain annoying to others. The reasons I uphold the standards of our faith as high as I can is because the eternal salvation of the souls entrusted to me is at stake.

Consider, James 3:1-2 "Not many of you should become teachers, my brothers and sisters, for you know that we who teach will be judged with greater strictness. 2 For all of us make many mistakes. Anyone who makes no mistakes in speaking is perfect, able to keep the whole body in check with a bridle." (Obviously, no one)

I am fully capable of being annoying for many reasons having nothing to do with faith! Yet, it has been my experience that those who persevere in prayer and learning experience a most wonderful transformation. I was completely taken aback, those many years ago, when I, as a Lutheran was on retreat with the pastor and parish council at Saint Mary's Episcopalian Benedictine Convent and discovered the writing of Saint Theresa of Avila and Saint John of the Cross. This discovery of mystical Catholic spirituality was the end of Lutheranism for me and the beginning of the Catholic faith. I never knew that the love of God could be found so strongly and deeply within. I went from mainly knowing truths about God to knowing God as God. It was a big deal.

Advent can still have a reflective and penitential for us despite the cultural pressure to whoop it up way ahead of time. With some prayerful attention, we can prepare ourselves to truly experience the Birth of Christ at Christmas as the unveiling of that divine light that, shining in our hearts, transforms our all-about-me to all about God, all about love, all about life and the joy and satisfaction that comes from that. You could fall in love again with the Lord or fall in love for the first time. In any case, Advent is a preparation to receive something good, the greatest present, to know that life really is about something and that you as you is an essential part of it.

It's worth the wait.



 * Discernment: Prayer is an integral part of continuing to discern their service and the type of service they will offer.
* Collection of information: Candidates must provide sacramental certificates of baptism, confirmation, and marriage (if applicable).
