

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From The Rector of Saint James Cathedral-Basilica

Dear parishioners and friends of Saint James,

Here we are already at the Second Sunday of Advent. In God's word from the Prophet Isaiah, we hear "Comfort, give comfort to my people, says your God. Speak tenderly to Jerusalem . . ." I hear these words and I struggle with this notion of 'comfort'. I must admit, and even though you may find it unseemly, I find myself fascinated with a twenty-five-year-old from Barcelona. I know, terrible. She is a model and influencer based in Barcelona, pink hair, a gamer and interested in fitness. She is a hard worker and earns up to \$12,000 a month. A passionate Scorpio, I read she is "a strong determined woman, independent in her actions and generous in her willingness to help others." She has 211,000 followers on Instagram.

While I may be fascinated and you might by now be alarmed, I'm not fascinated for what you may be thinking. Her name is Aitana López and she isn't a real person, at all, 100% fabricated. She is the first AI generated Latina model and was developed by the company called "The Clueless". For where I am about to go with this, that is an apt name for the company.

We pray in Night Prayer on Saturdays from Psalm 4, "O men, how long will your hearts be closed, will you love what is futile and seek what is false?" We tend to project all manner of desirable or undesirable qualities on friends, neighbors, movie stars, musicians, lovers and even God. We fall in love all the time with objects of our minds and are devastated when their reality finally confronts us. The old-fashioned word for this is 'idolatry'.

God is constantly calling his people from false ideas and false images to the truth. When our idols don't measure up to our expectations and our world is falling apart all around us, God is there trying to comfort us, bring us hope, lead us to the truth, reassure us with his love. Imagine that, God is true love and calling us to love each other truly, but . . .

It's a constant rescue mission on God's part. That's why God sends prophets, that's why God came to us in Jesus. During Advent we have yet another chance to let go of all that is false and come to the true light that is Christ. Some might crudely say, "Snap out of it." Despite our addiction to idols, Jesus comes as a remedy to build up what we have broken down, in ourselves and in others.

This Aitana López should come as a serious warning about where we are heading. This death-wish of ours is fascinating in that we know God is right but we keep falling for the Evil One and his empty promises. Advent is a time to give it another try. We can choose God and live, not love what is futile and seek what is false.

READING I IS 40:1-5, 9-11 (Proclaimed in Spanish)

Comfort, give comfort to my people, says your God. Speak tenderly to Jerusalem, and proclaim to her that her service is at an end, her guilt is expiated; indeed, she has received from the hand of the LORD double for all her sins. A voice cries out: In the desert prepare the way of the LORD! Make straight in the wasteland a highway for our God! Every valley shall be filled in, every mountain and hill shall be made low; the rugged land shall be made a plain, the rough country, a broad valley. Then the glory of the LORD shall be revealed, and all people shall see it together; for the mouth of the LORD has spoken. Go up on to a high mountain, Zion, herald of glad tidings; cry out at the top of your voice, Jerusalem, herald of good news! Fear not to cry out and say to the cities of Judah: Here is your God! Here comes with power the Lord GOD, who rules by his strong arm; here is his reward with him, his recompense before him. Like a shepherd he feeds his flock; in his arms he gathers the lambs, carrying them in his bosom, and leading the ewes with care.

READING II 2 PT 3:8-14

Do not ignore this one fact, beloved, that with the Lord one day is like a thousand years and a thousand years like one day. The Lord does not delay his promise, as some regard "delay," but he is patient with you, not wishing that any should perish but that all should come to repentance. But the day of the Lord will come like a thief, and then the heavens will pass away with a mighty roar and the elements will be dissolved by fire, and the earth and everything done on it will be found out. Since everything is to be dissolved in this way, what sort of persons ought you to be, conducting yourselves in holiness and devotion, waiting for and hastening the coming of the day of God, because of which the heavens will be dissolved in flames and the elements melted by fire. But according to his promise we await new heavens and a new earth in which righteousness dwells. Therefore, beloved, since you await these things, be eager to be found without spot or blemish before him, at peace.

GOSPEL MK 1:1-8

The beginning of the gospel of Jesus Christ the Son of God. As it is written in Isaiah the prophet: Behold, I am sending my messenger ahead of you; he will prepare your way. A voice of one crying out in the desert: "Prepare the way of the Lord, make straight his paths." John the Baptist appeared in the desert proclaiming a baptism of repentance for the forgiveness of sins. People of the whole Judean countryside and all the inhabitants of Jerusalem were going out to him and were being baptized by him in the Jordan River as they acknowledged their sins. John was clothed in camel's hair, with a leather belt around his waist. He fed on locusts and wild honey. And this is what he proclaimed: "One mightier than I is coming after me. I am not worthy to stoop and loosen the thongs of his sandals. I have baptized you with water; he will baptize you with the Holy Spirit."

- * Collection of information: Candidates must provide sacramental certificates of baptism, confirmation, and marriage (if applicable).

The Season of Advent



Nick's #1 Musical Pet Peeve



One of the most beautiful Catholic Advent hymns is "O Come, O Come, Emmanuel." Sung in the original, the word endings would help a Latin scholar understand exactly who should rejoice and why. But the way the text is set in English hymnals, we're led to think that Emmanuel is the one being told to rejoice. Emmanuel doesn't need to be told to rejoice He's God, no? Israel is the one who should be rejoicing at the coming of the long-awaited Messiah.


Some hymnals/congregations try to overcome this by pushing through the whole refrain without stopping for a breath at the end of the first phrase of the refrain. Doing so only works if you have the breath control of an opera singer. Also, barging through the refrain breaks the underlying pulse of the music: HEAVY - light - light HEAVY - light - light (Thank you, Dr Alexander Peloquin, for your eye-opening hymn workshop back in 1976!)

A tiny change could keep me from wailing and gnashing my teeth for the four weeks of Advent:

Rejoice! Rejoice, O Israel! To you shall come Emmanuel.

If only they'd asked me... Bah! Humbug!

FEAST OF OUR LADY OF GUADALUPE

On 9th December 1531 Juan Diego saw The Virgin Mary on the Hill of Tepeyac, near Mexico City, who asked him to build a church there. He told the Spanish Archbishop of Mexico, who advised him to return to the hill to ask the "lady" for a sign to prove her identity. First Mary healed Juan's sick Uncle, and then, on 12th December 1531, she told him to gather flowers from the top of the hill - where he found roses growing on the barren ground. She gathered up the roses in his cloak (tilma) for him to take back to the Archbishop. When he opened his tilma to show the roses, they fell to the floor and this image of Our Lady was imprinted upon it.
