### From The Rector of Saint James Cathedral-Basilica

Dear parishioners and friends of Saint James,

Even as I am writing this, the Christmas decorations are diminishing, being packed away for next year's celebrations. From my perspective and from what I have heard, our Advent and Christmas went very well this year. I was very happy to say on numerous occasions that this was my best Christmas and New Year at the Cathedral so far. The hard work and cooperation of many people, some for the very first time this year was very effective, encouraging and inspiring. Some might say I was starting to glimpse what it really means to be a pastor. I would rather say I got a good sense of what it means for us to be a community.

In barely a day, we went from Epiphany to Ordinary Time. In a month it will already be Ash Wednesday and the beginning of Lent. Since time is passing at a super-sonic pace, why not start thinking about what we can do to enhance and make productive our season of Lent. I know that there will be the now customary talk against symbolic and not terribly useful fasts of 'giving up' chocolate, doughnuts, or chicken wings, (maybe not chicken wings) intended to encourage us to make better choices of what to 'give up'.

The season of Lent began with people not preparing to receive full initiation into the sacraments to join with those who were in deepening their commitment to the Lord, the Church and the pursuit of holiness. Depriving oneself of some favorite food or pastime for a period could strengthen one's resolve and foster discipline but I think we all know that does not usually happen.

My suggestion would be to pray more, study Scripture more and to be generous to others, particularly those most in need. We could do those things that make it easier for us to love others – that is – by loving ourselves in life supporting ways. Being more positive may mean being less negative and giving up negativity for Lent would be a great thing to do.

Let me leave you with this quote from Dr Martin Luther King, Jr, whose birthday we celebrate this week. Something to meditate on that might give some ideas for our Lenten preparation for Easter:

"You know, a lot of people don't love themselves. And they go through life with deep and haunting emotional conflicts. So, the length of life means that you must love yourself. And you know what loving yourself also means? It means that you've got to accept yourself."

The person most in need of love and acceptance may be you receiving it from you.

READING I 1 Sm 3:3b-10, 19 (Proclaimed in Spanish)



### THE LEGEND OF SAINT PAUL OF THEBES THE FIRST HERMIT (Feastday - January 15)

"The Life of Saint Paul the First Hermit was written in Latin by Jerome, probably in 375-376. Paul of Thebes was born around 227 in the Thebaid of Egypt. Paul and his married sister lost their parents. In order to obtain Paul's inheritance, his brother-in-law sought to betray him to the persecutors. According to Jerome's Vitae Patrum, Paul fled to the Theban desert as a young man during the persecution of Decius and Valerianus around AD 250. He lived in the mountains of this desert in a cave near a clear spring and a palm tree, the leaves of which provided him with clothing and the fruit of which provided him with his only source of food until he was 43 years old, when a raven started bringing him half a loaf of bread daily. He would remain in that cave for the rest of his life, almost a hundred years. Paul of Thebes is known to posterity because around the year 342, Anthony the Great was told in a dream about the older hermit's existence, and went to find him. Jerome related that Anthony the Great and Paul met when the latter was aged 113. They conversed with each other for one day and one night. The Synaxarium shows each saint inviting the other to bless and break the bread, as a token of honor. Paul held one side, putting the other side into the hands of Father Anthony, and soon the bread broke through the middle and each took his part. When Anthony next visited him, Paul was dead. Anthony clothed him in a tunic which was a present from Athanasius of Alexandria and buried him, with two lions helping to dig the grave. Father Anthony returned to his monastery taking with him the robe which was woven with palm leaf. He honored the robe so much that he only wore it twice a year: at the Feast of Easter, and at the Pentecost."

### The Announcement of Easter and the Moveable Feasts 2024 Ascension on Sunday

On the Epiphany of the Lord, after the singing of the Gospel, a Deacon or cantor, in keeping with an ancient practice of Holy Church, announces from the ambo the moveable feasts of the current year according to this formula:

\*\*Know, dear brethren, (brothers and sisters,) that, as we have rejoiced at the Nativity of our\*\*

Lord Jesus Christ. so by leave of God's mercy
We announce to you also the joy of his Resurrection, who is our Savior.
On the fourteenth day of February will fall Ash Wednesday, and the beginning of the fast
of the most sacred Lenten season. On the thirty-first day of March,
you will celebrate with joy Easter Day, the Paschal feast of our Lord Jesus Christ.
On the twelfth day of May will be the Ascension of our Lord Jesus Christ.
On the nineteenth day of May the feast of Pentecost.
On the second day of June, the feast of the Most Holy Body and Blood of Christ.
On the first day of December, the First Sunday of the Advent
of our Lord Jesus Christ, to whom is honor and glory forever and ever. Amen.

### Strange But True!

Did you know that for twenty-five years I worked part-time as a square dance caller? I've performed as far west as San Francisco, CA and as far east as Berlin, Germany!

In 1991, shortly after graduating from "Caller College" - a five-day intensive workshop covering music, timing, body flow, and choreography - I became more fluent than any normal person would want to be on the topic of copyright law.

In the late 1980s, BMI and ASCAP (the two major music licensing agencies in the US) realized that seven nights every week, in thousands of dance halls across the country, copyrighted music was being performed but without any royalties winding up in their bank accounts. THE HORROR! (Seriously, royalties earned from public performances of copyrighted music allow professional composers to live indoors and eat regularly. Copyright laws, therefore, are not evil.)

The licensing agencies were threatening to shut down the square dancing activity if a solution wasn't found immediately, if not sooner. To save the day CALLERLAB (think of them as the Curia of Callers) negotiated a licensing agreement with BMI and ASCAP. Members would pay an annual licensing fee based on the number of dances they call over the course of a year. Callers who were caught not paying the licensing fee could be charged \$10,000 per song, per dance!

### What has any of this to do with Sunday Mass?

St. James pays annual licensing fees for the right to print and broadcast the copyrighted music in our hymnal during our worship services. On your seat today you found a card containing the lyrics of our closing song: "We Shall Overcome". I chose this hymn because (a) it's appropriate for MLK Weekend; and (b) the hymn is in the public domain. A song in public domain has no copyright claims on the reproduction or performance of its words and music. This hymn doesn't appear in

our hymnal. But since it's in the public domain, I was allowed to make you copies of the lyrics. So sing your hearts out safe in the knowledge that CBSJ won't be stormed by an army of lawyers!

### Did you know...

The song "Happy Birthday" is still under copyright? Every time you hear it sung in a movie or on television, the copyright holder is earning another royalty fee.

The copyrighted Jeopardy Theme Song has earned composer Merv Griffin and his estate over \$100 million in royalties?

Strange... but true!!
