From The Rector of Saint James Cathedral-Basilica

Dear parishioners and friends of Saint James,

On what I would characterize as a 'self-discovery by travel' blog, Brendan John Lee on brenontheroad.com has a post, "What People Are Doing When They Travel to 'Find Themselves". There you can find a quote by Bob Moawad, "The best day of your life is the one on which you decide your life is your own. No apologies or excuses. No one to lean on, rely on, or blame. The gift is yours – it is an amazing journey – and you alone are responsible for the quality of it. This is the day your life really begins." Life as a journey . . .

Paradoxically, as a Christian you find your own unique life journey by deciding to follow Jesus as the Way. After that, the only fault is not remaining steadfast in following, rather than trying to lead God. If life is not found in the fullest, no applicable apologies or excuses, there is no one to lean on, rely on or blame other than yourself. The gift of life is given and only your faith in God determines the quality of it.

For us at Saint James, the theme of the journey is all around us. We are the first stop on the now annual diocesan Lenten Church pilgrimage. The famous Camino de Santiago/the Way of Saint James that ends in Compostela in Spain is a constat reminder to us, whether we walk the actual Camino or walk with Jesus through life right here, that there is a starting place and a goal, baptism leading to entrance into the Kingdom of God.

The pandemic pretty much squashed my dream of somehow linking up Saint James Cathedral with pilgrims departing from New York to walk the Camino in Europe. "Your Daily Camino" as it appears in the bulletin is an opportunity to use each day here-and-now as a guide on the trail to grow closer to God and be encouraged on the journey. I envisioned the bulletin to be more than simply a Sunday post of parish activities but more like a weekly spiritual guide, a kind of roadmap for every day of the week.

At the Pro-Vita Mass, Fr Michael Gelfant, the associate state chaplain for the New York State Knights of Columbus Council, remarked that he reads our bulletin every week, as do many people outside the parish. We are very fortunate to have with us Mrs Beeyean Santos as our creative director, she is the one who designed the present bulletin. The artwork is amazing and the content is much more robust which has further increased its popularity.



So he went into their synagogues, preaching and driving out demons throughout the whole of Galilee.

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FAITH LEADS TO FAITHFULNESS



- * Collection of information: Candidates must provide sacramental certificates of baptism, confirmation, and marriage (if applicable).


SAINT JOHN DE MATHA PRAYER

O God, You were pleased to institute by heavenly direction, through St. John De Matha, the order of the Holy Trinity, for redeeming captives from the power of the Saracens; grant, we implore You, that by the suffrage of his merits, we may be delivered by Your grace from captivity of soul and body. Through our Lord Jesus Christ, Your Son, who being God, lives and reigns with You in the unity of the same Holy Spirit, forever and ever. Amen.

The Feast of Saint Agatha is celebrated twice a year: February and August. Such is the devotion to Saint Agatha, that she is now recognized as the patron and protector of all.

St. Agatha is referred to in the martyrology of St. Jerome, the Calendar of Carthage, and other cited works. Even though she was regarded among the most revered virgin martyrs in Christianity, the specifics of her martyrdom are not of much historical value. Catania and Palermo are both debated as her birthplace, and both of her parents were nobles in society. It is also evident from the tradition that she is considered as belonging to a wealthy family. Dedicating her virginity and life to God at a young age, she rejected the persistent courting of a Roman prefect who was sent to govern Sicily by the emperor Decius.

Her rejection of the Roman Prefect and dedication to her faith was perceived (by the prefect) as an insult, and it led to her cruel torture and imprisonment. Her breasts were cut off, which is reflected in images and statues of her. During her imprisonment, St. Peter the Apostle visited her in her visions, comforting her and healing her pain and wounds with his prayers. An attempt to burn her at the stake was made, but accounts tell us that an earthquake



occurred, leading to the people protesting for her release. Agatha was imprisoned once again and died in captivity.


St. Scholastica was St. Benedict's twin sister. They lived in the 5th century. At an early age, Scholastica entered a convent joining a Benedictine order for women. The Benedictine motto ora et labora (pray and work) became a real joy for the young abbess, for she had practiced it since childhood. She found it the best way to keep her mind occupied with God even though her duties as abbess kept her busy most of the day. Pope Gregory explained that, although Benedict had set out a rule of life for these holy women, it was Scholastica's duty to see that they kept it faithfully, cheerfully and regarded it as the best means for their sanctification.

Each year, Benedict and Scholastica met to discuss their way of life and the various spiritual challenges in the two religious houses. Since women were not allowed to enter his monastery, Benedict and a few companions met her in the guest house at Monte Casino.

One day when Scholastica was very ill, her brother came to visit her at the convent. They spent the day singing psalms and speaking about the spiritual life, its compensations and challenges. When evening came, they sat down to supper and continued the conversation until quite late. Strict orders of the monastery only allowed one day for a monk to visit his family and never allowed him to stay away overnight.

After a delightful day of visiting, Scholastica asked her brother to stay the night since she was afraid that she would not live until his next visit. Benedict, an obedient monk, would not hear of such a thing. Legend has it that Scholastica folded her hands in prayer. When she looked up a minute later, lightning flashed in the sky, thunder roared ominously, and such a downpour of rain began that Benedict and his monks could not safely leave the house. Realizing what had happened, Benedict reproached her: "What have you done, my sister?" Scholastica answered simply, "I asked a favor of you, and you refused to listen to me. So I asked my God, and He, more generous than you, granted my request." Once again Scholastica's pleas won the favor she was seeking.

In the days that ensued, Scholastica became weaker and finally succumbed to the illness. While praying in his room, as Benedict looked toward the convent, he



saw a white dove circling the building, finally disappearing into the blue. He interpreted this event to mean that his sister had died and her soul had gone to heaven. The white dove is a symbol of her purity.

St. Scholastica was outstanding for her simplicity and faith. She spoke to God directly, in reverent familiarity, without complex or elaborate ritual. As an abbess, St. Scholastica instilled in her sisters the necessity of living in accordance with the great Benedictine aim: "That in all things God may be glorified." The Benedictine sisterhoods flourished under Scholastica and through the years to the present day. She demonstrated great faith and felt that it was more important to tend the needs of others than to follow a rule rigidly. St. Gregory the Great said of St. Scholastica, "She could do more because she loved more."

Musical Lenten Rigor

A few months ago, I wrote that we're not able sustain the level of exuberance called for at Easter beyond the fifty days of the season. Similarly, our Easter celebrations can't have any impact unless we scale back during Lent. I'm writing to explain - as the grade school nuns would put it - what you'll be "giving up" musically during Lent.

First, the Mass Setting we'll sing is based on the melodies of the traditional Requiem Mass. The music of the Requiem Mass is simple yet that simplicity can leave you awestruck. Using themes from the Mass for the Dead is a musical reminder of the Ash Wednesday admonition: "Remember that you are dust and unto dust you shall return." Listen to a recording of the chanted Requiem, or - even more luxurious: the Duruflé Requiem - and you'll recognize many of the melodies you'll be singing during Lent.

Next, I'll be toning down the cathedral organ. Gone will be the bright mixtures and bold trumpets. Doing so will make their return on Easter Sunday even more exciting.

Finally, replacing the marches, jigs, and toccatas you hear most Sundays will be quieter, more subdued postludes.

Last year Father Bryan shared a wise piece of advice: You can do the things you want PROVIDED you tell people WHAT you're doing, and WHY. Having done that, I leave you with the Jewish Yom Kippur greeting: "Have an easy fast."
