From The Rector of Saint James Cathedral-Basilica

Dear parishioners and friends of Saint James,

His Holiness Pope Francis, in his message delivered from Saint John Lateran Archbasilica on the occasion of the 32nd World Day of the Sick makes a most salient statement, "Let us remember this central truth in life: we came into the world because someone welcomed us; we were made for love; and we are called to communion and fraternity. This aspect of our lives is what sustains us, above all at times of illness and vulnerability. It is also the first therapy that we must all adopt in order to heal the diseases of the society in which we live."

The Pope's address is entitled, "It is not good that man should be alone". Healing the Sick by Healing Relationships" His address is all the more remarkable because although what he says is glaringly obvious, that we tend to overlook the obvious or even run from it like it was the plague is even more glaring.

Our readings for today highlight the double tragedy of illness, painful suffering often coupled with fear of death and isolation. Leprosy is a perfect example of the two-fold horror of sickness, a person gradually loses control of and actual parts of their body and because of the contagious nature of the disease, they are abandoned and shunned by family, friends and society. Exactly when a person needs the most to be cared for, they are relegated to the 'company' of those who themselves share their fate and aren't in the best position to be very helpful.

In my early years I had wanted to be a medical doctor. As a priest I have seen first-hand the "chicken or egg first" dilemma of sickness played out many times, as it is difficult to determine whether broken or non-existent relationships causes illness or illness results in broken relationships and isolation. Often, it is both at the same time. My experience has been that if one is willing to look below the surface of things, a person endures a deep emotional hurt and then disease, dis-ease follows. Before antibiotics, to contract leprosy was akin to being killed twice, first socially and then physically. Two diseases in one.

The Pope is urging us to focus on the quality of our relationships, with people we know and people we don't, living or not. I'm convinced that unforgiveness, whether being unforgiven by others or not forgiving oneself is a major cause of illness. Once forgiven, many people experience a dramatic recovery of health. Pope Francis says that war is the most terrible of social diseases. The only way to truly end a war between nations or people is through forgiveness and that rarely happens. A sick society produces sick people.

If we had ever taken the Gospel seriously, the world would have been freed from sin and sickness long ago. Jesus doesn't hesitate to touch the leper prior to his complete healing. This Lent would be an excellent time to consider some hands on, big-time forgiveness. We can live with people eating chocolate but not with people hating and not forgiving each other.

PRAYER OF SAINT ONESIMUS



THE APPARITION OF OUR LADY OF LOURDES IN SAINT BERNADETTE'S OWN WORDS

I had gone down one day with two other girls to the bank of the river when suddenly I heard a kind of rustling sound. I turned my head toward the field by the side of the river but the trees seemed quiet still and the noise was evidently not from them. Then I looked up and caught sight of the cave where I saw a lady wearing a lovely white dress with a bright belt. On top of each of her feet was a pale vellow rose, the same color as her rosary beads. At this I rubbed my eyes, thinking I was seeing things, and I put my hands into the fold of my dress where my rosary was. I wanted to make the sign of the cross but for the life of me I couldn't manage it and my hand just fell down. Then the lady made the sign of the cross herself and at the second attempt I managed to do the same, though my hands were trembling. Then I began to say the rosary while the lady let her beads slip through her fingers, without moving her lips. When I stopped saying the Hail Mary, she immediately vanished. I asked my two companions if they had noticed any- thing, but they said no. Of course they wanted to know what I was doing and I told them that I had seen a lady wearing a nice white dress, though I didn't know who she was. I told them not to say anything about it, and they said I was silly to have anything to do with it. I said they were wrong and I came back next

Sunday, feeling myself drawn to the place....

The third time I went the lady spoke to me and asked me to come every day for fifteen days. I said I would and then she said that she wanted me to tell the priests to build a chapel there. She also told me to drink from the stream. I went to the Gave, the only stream I could see. Then she made me realize she was not speaking of the Gave and she indicated a little trickle of water close by. When I got to it I could only find a few drops, mostly mud. I cupped my hands to catch some liquid without success and then I started to scrape the ground. I managed to find a few drops of water but only at the fourth attempt was there a sufficient amount for any kind of drink. The lady then vanished and I went back home. I went back each day for two weeks and each time, except one Monday and one Friday, the lady appeared and told me to look for a stream and wash in it and to see that the priests build a chapel there. I must also pray, she said, for the conversion of sinners. I asked her many times what she meant by that, but she only smiled. Finally with out-stretched arms and eyes looking up to heaven she told me she was the Immaculate Conception. During the two weeks she told me three secrets but I was not to speak about them to anyone and so far I have not.

THE LIFE OF SAINT VALENTINE

St. Valentine, as the former Bishop of Terni, Narnia and Amelia, was on house arrest with Judge Asterius. While discussing religion and faith with the Judge, Valentine pledged the validity of Jesus. The judge immediately put Valentine and his faith to the test. St. Valentine was presented with the judge's blind daughter and told to restore her sight. If he succeeded, the judge vowed to do anything for Valentine. Placing his hands onto her eyes, Valentine restored the eyes, Valentine restored the child's vision. Judge Asterius was humbled and obeyed Valentine's requests. Asterius broke all the idols around his house, fasted for three days and became baptized, along with his family and entire 44-member household. The now faithful judge then freed all of his Christian inmates. St. Valentine was later arrested again for continuing to try to convert people to Christianity. He was sent to Rome under emperor Claudius Gothicus. Ŝt. Valentine was imprisoned for marrying Christian couples and aiding Christians being persecuted

by Claudius in Rome. Both acts were considered serious crimes. A relationship between the saint and emperor began to grow, until Valentine attempted to convince Claudius of Christianity. Claudius became raged and sentenced Valentine to death, commanding him to renounce his faith or be beaten with clubs and beheaded. St. Valentine refused to renounce his faith and Christianty and was executed outside the Flaminian Gate on February 14, 269. Other depictions of St. Valentine's arrests tell that he secretly married couples so husbands wouldn't have to go to war. Another variation of the legend of St. Valentine says he refused to sacrifice to pagan gods, was imprisoned and while imprisoned he healed the jailer's blind daughter. On the day of his execution, he left the girl a note signed, "Your Valentine," thus the origin of writing Valentine's Day cards.




ASH WEDNESDAY

Musical Lenten Rigor

A few months ago, I wrote that we're not able sustain the level of exuberance called for at Easter beyond the fifty days of the season. Similarly, our Easter celebrations can't have any impact unless we scale back during Lent. I'm writing to explain - as the grade school nuns would put it - what you'll be "giving up" musically during Lent.

First, the Mass Setting we'll sing is based on the melodies of the traditional Requiem Mass. The music of the Requiem Mass is simple yet that simplicity can leave you awestruck. Using themes from the Mass for the Dead is a musical reminder of the Ash Wednesday admonition: "Remember that you are dust and unto dust you shall return." Listen to a recording of the chanted Requiem, or - even more luxurious: the Durufle Requiem - and you'll recognize many of the melodies you'll be singing during Lent.

Next, I'll be toning down the cathedral organ. Gone will be the bright mixtures and bold trumpets. Doing so will make their return on Easter Sunday even more exciting.

Finally, replacing the marches, jigs, and toccatas you hear most Sundays will be quieter, more subdued postludes.

Last year Father Bryan shared a wise piece of advice: You can do the things you want PROVIDED you tell people WHAT you're doing, and WHY. Having done that, I leave you with the Jewish Yom Kippur greeting: "Have an easy fast."
