From The Rector of Saint James Cathedral-Basilica

Dear parishioners and friends of Saint James,

It is rather unusual for me to be away from the parish for two Sundays in a row. As I explained last week, I was away because I was asked to celebrate Masses for Black History Month. I also concelebrated the Diocesan Black History Month Mass with Bishop Brennan. In my preaching, I stressed the importance of these memorials for all people and Christians in particular, as it is a concrete demonstration of how an oppressed people can still produce men and women of singular excellence because of their faith in the Lord. When we think that all is lost or that no one has ever faced whatever challenge is drawing us to despair, we are reminded that with Christ there is still the victory and that with God, all things are possible. That's why we sing the hymn composed by Albert A. Goodson in 1956, "We've come this far by faith, leaning on the Lord. Trusting in his holy word. He's never failed us yet."

Goodson was born in 1933 in Los Angeles into a poor African-American family. He had a talent for music but because of his poverty, he used to 'practice' playing the piano on a wooden board. He got some education in music from musicians at the Los Angeles Saint Paul Baptist Church. Gerald Hines, the director of the church's two-hundred-member choir took him under his wing and Albert was introduced to famous Black artists of the time like Nat King Cole and Mahalia Jackson with whom he eventually toured. In an agonizing period in his life, Goodson composed that hymn believing it was the Lord himself speaking to him.

Is it any wonder then, why Jesus in an outrage destroys the 'merch' vendors in front of the Temple and scatters all their wares? The Lord first, period. We hear the Ten Commandments today, the Ten Words (Aseret HaDebarim/Decalogos/Decalogus), as they are often called. The first order of business is "I am the Lord. I am the first and only One. Keep my Day holy."

No messing around, the Lord states that the priority for the believer is the Lord alone. He commands that we appeal to no one but him for life, for help. Period. He commands that one day a week be given to Him exclusively. Period.

If you know me by now, you know where I'm going with this. There doesn't seem to be any grey area here. If the Lord is first, following the rest of the Commandments follows. If something or someone is more important to us, like those trying to make a fortune selling things in front of the Temple, impeding people's ability to serve the Lord, one is not likely to follow the rest of the Commandments.

In Lent we can ask ourselves the question, "Is the Lord foremost in my life?" and perhaps "Why not?" What have I put in front of my Temple? Where is my religion about making a life after my own designs, shaving off my devotion in ways that are convenient to me and don't diminish my drive for fun and profit?

Is it really that you don't want to be or be seen as a fanatic, a 'holy-roller' that prevents you from entering a God-centered life? Or something else?

Albert Goodson and so many have learned "He's never failed us yet. Oh, oh- oh- can't turn around, we've come this far by faith."

And so can you,

Ex 17:3-7


(Proclaimed in Spanish)

GOSPEL

Jn 4:5-42

Jesus came to a town of Samaria called Sychar, near the plot of land that Jacob had given to his son Joseph. Jacob's well was there. Jesus, tired from his journey, sat down there at the well. It was about noon. A woman of Samaria came to draw water. Jesus said to her, "Give me a drink." His disciples had gone into the town to buy food. The Samaritan woman said to him, "How can you, a Jew, ask me, a Samaritan woman, for a drink?" —For Jews use nothing in common with Samaritans.— Jesus answered and said to her, "If you knew the gift of God and who is saying to you, 'Give me a drink,' you would have asked him and he would have given you living water." The woman said to him, "Sir, you do not even have a bucket and the cistern is deep; where then can you get this living water? Are you greater than our father Jacob, who gave us this cistern and drank from it himself with his children and his flocks?" Jesus answered and said to her, "Everyone who drinks this water will be thirsty again; but whoever drinks the water I shall give will never thirst; the water I shall give will become in him a spring of water welling up to eternal life." The woman said to him, "Sir, give me this water, so that I may not be thirsty or have to keep coming here to draw water." Jesus said to her, "Go call your husband and come back." The woman answered and said to him, "I do not have a husband." Jesus answered her, "You are right in saying, 'I do not have a husband." For you have had five husbands and the one you have now is not your husband. What you have said is true." The woman Jesus said to her, "Give me a drink." His disciples had gone into the town to buy food. The Samaritan woman said to him, you have had five husbands, and the one you have now is not your husband. What you have said is true." The woman said to him, "Sir, I can see that you are a prophet. Our ancestors worshiped on this mountain; but you people say that the place to worship is in Jerusalem." Jesus said to her, "Believe me, woman, the hour is coming when you will worship the Father neither on this mountain nor in Jerusalem. You people worship what you do not understand; we worship what we understand, because salvation is from the Jews. But the hour is coming, and is now here, when true worshipers will worship the Father in Spirit and truth; and indeed the Father seeks such people to worship him. God is Spirit, and those who worship him must worship in Spirit and truth." The woman said to him, "I know that the Messiah is coming, the one called the Christ; when he comes, he will tell us everything." Jesus said to her, "I am he, the one speaking with you." At that moment his disciples returned, and were amazed that he was talking with a woman, but still no one said, "What are you looking for?" or "Why are you talking with her?" The woman left her water jar and went into the town and said to the people, "Come see a man who told me everything I have done. Could he possibly be the Christ?" They went out of the town and came to him. Meanwhile, the disciples urged him, "Rabbi, eat." But he said to them, "I have food to eat of which you do not know." So the disciples said to one another, "Could someone have brought him something to eat?" Jesus said to them, "My food is to do the will of the one who sent me and to finish his work. Do you not say, 'In four months the harvest will be here'? I tell you, look up and see the fields ripe for the harvest. The reaper is already receiving payment and gathering crops for eternal life, so that the sower and reaper can rejoice together. For here the saying is verified that 'One sows and another reaps.' I sent you to reap what you have not worked for; others have done the work, and you are sharing the fruits of their work." Many of the Samaritans of that town began to believe in him because of the word of the woman who testified, "He told me everything I have done." When the Samaritans came to him, they invited him to stay with them; and he stayed there two days. Many more began to believe in him because of his word, and they said to the woman, "We no longer believe because of your word; for we have heard for ourselves, and we know that this is truly the savior of the world."

PRAYER OF SAINT JOHN JOSEPH OF THE CROSS



Dominic was born on 2 April 1842 in the province of Turin, in northern Italy, to humble but very devout Christian parents. While still a boy he decided to become a faithful imitator of Jesus Christ and avoid anything that would distance him from the Lord.

At the age of 7 he made his First Holy Communion and at 12 became a spiritual son of John Bosco. Under the personal direction of this great Salesian saint, Dominic became a tabernacle for the Lord and a model and example of God's love for all people. With his life style he was an apostle and missionary of Jesus. Those who met him said he was not small in stature but rather frail and thin. He preferred to listen rather than speak. Humble and respectful towards all, he had a natural gift for settling arguments and quarrels which, at that age, often arose among his companions. His sole interest was God and how to lead others to use all their strength to serve him. What he lacked in physical strength was compensated by his moral stature, courage and acceptance of God's will whatever it might be.

The first biography of Dominic was written by his teacher Saint John Bosco and those pages led to many vocations including that of future Pope Benedict XV who watched over the Holy Childhood Society with loving concern. Dominique died at the age of 15 on 9 March 1857. He was canonised by Pope Pius XII in 1954.


SAINT CUNEGUNDES

Saint Cunegundes was the daughter of Siegfried I, one of eleven children. Siegfried was the first Count of Luxemburg and his pious wife was Hadeswigee. From her cradle, her virtuous parents instilled into their daughter the most tender sentiments of piety. When she was of an age to marry, they chose for her spouse Saint Henry, Duke of Bavaria, who at the death of the Emperor Otto III, was named King of Bavaria and the Holy Romans and was crowned on 6 June 1002. Queen Cunegundes was crowned at Paderborn on Saint Laurence's day. In the year 1014, she went

with her husband to Rome and they received the Imperial Crown from the hands of Pope Benedict VIII. With Saint Henry's consent, before their marriage, she had made a vow of perpetual Virginity. Afterwards, certain vile accusations were made against her chastity and the holy Empress, to remove the scandal of such a slander, trusting in God to prove her innocence, walked over redhot ploughshares without being hurt. The Emperor in turn, renounced and condemned, his own too scrupulous fears and credulity and from that time on, they lived in the strictest

union of heart, working together to promote piety and God's honour in every sphere. Going once to make a retreat in Hesse, Saint Cunegonde's fell dangerously ill and she made a vow to found a Monastery at Kaffungen, in the Diocese of Paderborn, if she recovered. This she executed in a stately manner and gave it to Nuns of the Order of Saint Benedict. Before it was finished, Saint Henry died in 1024. She earnestly recommended his soul to the prayers of the empire and especially to her dear Nuns and expressed her longing desire to join the Sisters. She had already exhausted her treasures in founding Bishoprics, Churches and Monasteries and in relieving the poor, and she had, therefore, little left to give. But intending to embrace perfect evangelical poverty, to renounce all things in order to serve God without obstacle, she assembled a great number of prelates at the dedication of her Church of Kaffungen, on the anniversary day of her husband's death in 1025. After the Gospel was sung at Mass, she offered on the Altar a relic of the True Cross and then putting off her imperial

robes, clothed herself with a poor habit. Her hair was cut off and the Bishop gave her the Veil and a ring as a pledge of her fidelity to her heavenly Spouse. After Cunegonde's was consecrated to God in religion, she seemed to forget entirely that she had been an Empress and served as the least in the Convent, being persuaded that she was such, before God. She prayed and read a great deal, worked with her hands and took singular pleasure in visiting and comforting the sick. In this way, she passed the last fifteen years of her life. When her last hour was drawing near, perceiving that they were preparing a cloth fringed with gold to cover her corpse after her death, she ordered it to be taken away and she could not rest until the promise was given, that she would be buried as a poor religious in her Habit. She died on the 3rd of March, 1040. Her body was carried to Bamberg and buried near that of her husband. She was solemnly Canonised by Pope Innocent III, in 1200.
