From The Rector of Saint James Cathedral-Basilica

Dear parishioners and friends of Saint James,

Apparently, we have survived The Apocalypse or whatever else was supposed to happen to us after Last Monday's Solar eclipse. The world or civilization as we've known it may not have come to an end but I do think there were some consequences. Seems so many people are tired or more tired than usual. But what would you expect after Palm Sunday, Holy Week, the Easter Vigil, Easter Sunday, a strong Nor' Easter, an earthquake, Divine Mercy Sunday and a Solar Eclipse? That's a lot.

Today is the Third Sunday of Easter. To me, it's an important moment in our liturgical calendar. Maybe we should call it Commitment Sunday. We had the expected crowds on Easter Sunday. We had the Low Sunday experience on Divine Mercy Sunday. Who will there be on the Third Sunday of Easter?

"A hen and a pig approached a church and read the advertised upcoming Sunday sermon topic, "What Can We Do to Help the Poor?" Immediately, the hen suggested they feed them bacon and eggs. The pig thought about that for a moment and said, 'There is only one thing wrong with feeding bacon and eggs to the poor. For you it only requires a contribution, but for me it requires total commitment!"

Holy Week and Easter are history. For many, the thrill is gone away. The flowers are clearly past their peak, the decorations looking like they've always been there. We've heard most of the traditional Easter hymns. The Resurrection has been absorbed back into the regular fabric of urban life.

Our Gospel is the continuation of the Gospel for last Wednesday, with the disciples who had been going away from Jerusalem on the way to Emmaus. Jesus appears to them, rebukes them for their lack of faith and belief and eats a meal with them. They go back and tell everyone how they met Jesus alive and while they were saying this, Jesus appears again and they are all having panic attacks, ready to pass out. Jesus has to prove himself all over again. He has another meal with them. Then, he opens their eyes to understand the Scriptures. They probably knew most of the Bible by heart and didn't even realize they never really understood it.

The resurrection of Jesus is the most significant event to occur in human history and in the spacetime continuum. But to understand it will take more than popping in to church every-so-often, a prayer here and there. This isn't easy. Let's stop fooling ourselves. They say nothing arouses more false hope than the first four hours of a diet. People who knew Jesus in his earthly life and actually witnessed him as resurrected still didn't get it. It took time and God's grace.

To gain eternal life requires diligence and hard work – commitment.

READING I: Acts 3:13-15, 17-19

(Proclaimed in Spanish)

READING II: 1 John 2:1-5a

My children, I am writing this to you so that you may not commit sin. But if anyone does sin, we have an Advocate with the Father, Jesus Christ the righteous one. He is expiation for our sins, and not for our sins only but for those of the whole world. The way we may be sure that we know him is to keep his commandments. Those who say, "I know him," but do not keep his commandments are liars, and the truth is not in them. But whoever keeps his word, the love of God is truly perfected in him.

GOSPEL: Luke 24:35-48

The two disciples recounted what had taken place on the way, and how Jesus was made known to them in the breaking of bread. While they were still speaking about this, he stood in their midst and said to them, "Peace be with you." But they were startled and terrified and thought that they were seeing a ghost. Then he said to them, "Why are you troubled? And why do questions arise in your hearts? Look at my hands and my feet, that it is I myself. Touch me and see, because a ghost does not have flesh and bones as you can see I have." And as he said this, he showed them his hands and his feet. While they were still incredulous for joy and were amazed, he asked them, "Have you anything here to eat?" They gave him a piece of baked fish; he took it and ate it in front of them. He said to them, "These are my words that I spoke to you while I was still with you, that everything written about me in the law of Moses and in the prophets and psalms must be fulfilled." Then he opened their minds to understand the Scriptures. And he said to them, "Thus it is written that the Christ would suffer and rise from the dead on the third day and that repentance, for the forgiveness of sins, would be preached in his name to all the nations, beginning from Jerusalem. You are witnesses of these things."

THINGS YOU MIGHT NOT KNOW ABOUT SAINT BERNADETTE

- 1. Bernadette's feast day is April 16th! People usually celebrate her story on the feast of Our Lady of Lourdes (February 11th), and forget that Bernadette has her own feast day! In some countries, the Catholic Church celebrates Bernadette's feast on February 18, which is the day that Our Lady told her "I do not promise to make you happy in this world, but in the next."
- 2. At the age of 14, Bernadette was only 4 and a half feet tall...about the size of an average 7 year old! This is because she didn't eat a lot as a child, and was often sick.
- 3. Bernadette's body is incorrupt, which means that it is preserved by God from decay! You can see her body when you visit Nevers, France (the site of her convent...the Sisters of Charity still live and work there to this day!).
- 4. The story goes that Bernadette didn't like painted images of Mary...she said that they didn't look like her Lady at all. The only image she would pray with is this one (which tradition says was painted by St. Luke). She said this image looked the most like the Lady who appeared to have it the greatte. It's called Our Lady of Combrain her in the grotto. It's called Our Lady of Cambrai.
- 5. Franz Werfel, the man who wrote the famous book "The Song of Bernadette" was actually Jewish! During World War II, he and his family had to flee from Austria to France, then cross the Pyrenees mountains. While on the run, he took shelter in Lourdes for 5 weeks. He was so moved by the hospitality shown to him at Lourdes, that he promised St. Bernadette and Our Lady that if he made it to America alive, he would write a book about their story. He did indeed escape safely, and wrote the book "The Song of Bernadette".
- 6. Bernadette's favorite book was the Imitation of Christ, and her favorite saints were St. Joseph, St. Francis of Assisi, and St. Bernard of Clairvaux.
- 7. Bernadette prayed the Stations of the Cross every day, even when it wasn't Lent!
- 8. Here's a prayer Bernadette wrote herself and prayed often:

O Jesus, give me, I beg You

The bread of humility


The bread of charity

Jesus, Mary, the Cross, I want no other friends but these.
















Holy Week HIGHLIGHT SAINT JAMES CATHEDRAL-BASILICA
