From The Rector of Saint James Cathedral-Basilica

Dear parishioners and friends of Saint James,

Today is our first Sunday in Ordinary time since February. We've noted before the prevailing sense that time seems to be going faster and faster. I've said I believe is it mainly to be attributed to our disconnection from the regular cycles of nature caused by artificial lighting and the near ubiquity of computers, screens of all types, digital everything. Are we forgetting we are human beings and not machines?

I can remember the time I was first amazed to meet someone who couldn't read an analogue clock, you know, the kind with 'hands', one for hours, the other for minutes. Hmm, people who never typed something on a manual typewriter, played a record on a turntable, turned a knob on a TV to find a station on UHF (you know, channels 21, 25, 31, 41, 47 . . .) The digital disconnect makes time seem to go faster and faster and past months seem like a very long time ago.

Being out of synch with nature can be bad but the readings for this Sunday highlight a worse case scenario. The reading from Genesis shows how ego-centricity entered human life, the Gospel shows one of its devastating consequences and the reading from II Corinthians how it can be corrected. Genesis details how our natural link with God was frayed and at times even severed. Eve was told she could become like the 'powerful ones', the gods, through knowledge of good and evil. She didn't see that this self-conscious knowledge, "good for me, bad for me" would lead to uncontrolled desire and believing oneself to be a god instead of God being God.

Jesus says that it can get so bad that a person cannot distinguish between God and Satan, attributing to the devil what is of God and of God to the devil. He says it is an unforgiveable sin, blasphemy against the Holy Spirit. The religious experts were saying that Jesus cast out demons by the evil spirit of Beelzebub, thereby attributing to Satan that which of God. This is about as out-of-synch as a person can get.

Saint Paul says that God who raised Jesus from the dead will also raise those who put their faith in him. The conversion to a person who fears God and lives a righteous life can be painful and fraught with difficulties, like the outer person dying while the inner one is reborn, but the new person has a permanent dwelling place in and with God - back in synch.

We continue our prayers, meditations and spiritual study to stay in synch and on board with the One who will save us from self-destruction. To me all this is sobering, even frightening at times, worthy of the scariest of horror movies to think that one could be so deluded as to be unable to tell God from the devil. Even Jesus' own family was told to come to get him because people were saying "He is out of his mind". We should never underestimate the cost of our salvation and the challenges required to stay on right terms with the Lord.

READING II: 2 Corinthians 4:13-5:1

Brothers and sisters: Since we have the same spirit of faith, according to what is written, I believed, therefore I spoke, we too believe and therefore we speak, knowing that the one who raised the Lord Jesus will raise us also with Jesus and place us with you in his presence. Everything indeed is for you, so that the grace bestowed in abundance on more and more people may cause the thanksgiving to overflow for the glory of God. Therefore, we are not discouraged; rather, although our outer self is wasting away, our inner self is being renewed day by day. For this momentary light affliction is producing for us an eternal weight of glory beyond all comparison, as we look not to what is seen but to what is unseen; for what is seen is transitory, but what is unseen is eternal. For we know that if our earthly dwelling, a tent, should be destroyed, we have a building from God, a dwelling not made with hands, eternal in heaven.

GOSPEL: Mark 3:20-35

Jesus came home with his disciples. Again the crowd gathered, making it impossible for them even to eat. When his relatives heard of this they set out to seize him, for they said, "He is out of his mind." The scribes who had come from Jerusalem said, "He is possessed by Beelzebul," and "By the prince of demons he drives out demons." Summoning them, he began to speak to them in parables, "How can Satan drive out Satan? If a kingdom is divided against itself, that kingdom cannot stand. And if a house is divided against itself, that house will not be able to stand. And if Satan has risen up against himself and is divided, he cannot stand; that is the end of him. But no one can enter a strong man's house to plunder his property unless he first ties up the strong man. Then he can plunder the house. Amen, I say to you, all sins and all blasphemies that people utter will be forgiven them. But whoever blasphemes against the Holy Spirit will never have forgiveness, but is guilty of an everlasting sin." For they had said, "He has an unclean spirit." His mother and his brothers arrived. Standing outside they sent word to him and called him. A crowd seated around him told him, "Your mother and your brothers and your sisters are outside asking for you." But he said to them in reply, "Who are my mother and my brothers?" And looking around at those seated in the circle he said, "Here are my mother and my brothers. For whoever does the will of God is my brother and sister and mother."

10 Miracles of SAINT ANTHONY OF PADUA

In Lisbon, to resolve a feud, a dead man was made to speak to prove the innocence of another.

9. The Miser's Heart

At the funeral of a wealthy but heartless man, Anthony revealed that the man's heart was found not in his body, but in his treasure chest.


10. A Violent Husband

Who was St. Barnabas?

Barnabas was one of the very earliest followers of Jesus and a leader of the early church. His story is told in the Acts of the Apostles and he is also mentioned in some of Paul's letters. Originally called Joseph, he was given his new name of Barnabas by those who knew him well, it means son of encouragement'. His new name certainly fits what we know of his character and actions.

Barnabas was willing to give from the heart

We first hear of Barnabas in the New Testament due to his simple act of stewardship and sharing. He sold land he owned and donates the proceeds to the church to be used to support the poor.

Barnabas was courageous in God's service

When Paul came to Jerusalem after his conversion, most of the Christians there wanted nothing to do with him for they had known him as a persecutor of Christians. But Barnabas, guided by God was willing to take a calculated risk on Paul. He sought Paul out, spoke with him, and having weighed him up, vouched for him. We owe much of our New Testament to the work of Paul and in his preaching and evangelism he was used by God in the creation of many of the early Christian communities. Imagine if Barnabas had not been willing to obey God's call?


Barnabas was generous, compassionate and kind

Later, Paul and Barnabas travelled far and wide, sharing the good news of God's love in Jesus. On one journey they took a young man called Mark with them. This traveling ministry was tough and dangerous; they literally were risking their lives. Part way, Mark turned back. When Paul and Barnabas were about to set out again, Barnabas suggested taking Mark along again. Paul was against it, saying that Mark was not dependable. But Barnabas wanted to give Mark a second chance, and so he and Mark went off on one journey, while Paul took Silas and went on another. Apparently Mark responded well to the trust given him by Barnabas, the "son of encouragement," since we find that Paul recognizes the change in Mark and later speaks of him as a valuable assistant.

Barnabas rejoiced in what God did in and through other people


Barnabas, who became one of the leaders of the Church was asked to help in the growth of a new congregation in Antioch. He didn't arrive thinking he'd whip them into shape, instead we read, 'he came and saw the grace of God, he rejoiced and he exhorted them all to remain faithful to the Lord with steadfast devotion.' Barnabas called Paul over to help in this work at Antioch and both he and Paul grew in their faith and ministry. And the Church grew too: a great many people became Christians – indeed it was here at Antioch that the followers of Jesus were first called 'Christians'. Born in Cyprus, Barnabas also died there in AD 61 when he was martyred for his faith. He stayed faithful and willing to give everything right to the end. We celebrate his life and example particularly on his feast day which is June 11th.
