To the faithful parishioners of St. James Cathedral,

Hard as it is to believe we have begun November! For Catholics, the focus of this month is on remembering All Saints and All Souls. Family faith formation calls us to celebrate these special people in our lives. Here are some suggestions for family activities for the coming month; I hope they are helpful!

All Saints' Day (November 1st):

Our goal here for families is to witness the importance of All Saints' Day, honoring all saints, known and unknown. Some ways parents and children can witness to each other and their neighbors is by:

- o **Storytelling:** Share stories of various saints and their contributions to our faith.
- o **Art Projects:** Create saint-themed crafts, such as saint masks or stained-glass windows, dress students as their favorite saint.
- o **Interactive Discussions:** parents, grandparents, children, and all family members share their favorite saints and why they inspire them. These may also be other family members and friends who have inspirational examples of faith.

Throughout November, we can continue the theme of sainthood and explore how students can embody saintly virtues in their daily lives. We do this through **Family Service Projects**; we organize a family service project to help the community, inspired by the charitable works of saints. The saints also inspire us to pray more; families can choose an evening to read scripture together, say the rosary, or attend a daily mass.


By the end of the month, we celebrate Thanksgiving and the beginning of the Advent Season. We prepare for the Advent season by connecting our experiences of the saints and the stories we have shared to the anticipation of Christ's birth. As families, we can make an **Advent Wreath** we place on our dining room table and light each night. We can also make a Jessie Tree. A **Jesse Tree** is a tree or tree-like representation that is decorated with ornaments to depict Jesus' family tree and the events leading up to his birth. The name comes from Isaiah 11:1, which refers to Jesus as a shoot from the stump of Jesse, the father of King David.

I hope these family prayer activities for each week provide a clear and engaging plan for your family faith activities in November. Let's pray for each other this month so that we may grow in sainthood!

READING I: Genesis 2:18-24

READING II: Hebrews 7:23-28

Brothers and sisters: The levitical priests were many because they were prevented by death from remaining in office, but Jesus, because he remains forever, has a priesthood that does not pass away. Therefore, he is always able to save those who approach God through him, since he lives forever to make intercession for them. It was fitting that we should have such a high priest: holy, innocent, undefiled, separated from sinners, higher than the heavens. He has no need, as did the high priests, to offer sacrifice day after day, first for his own sins and then for those of the people; he did that once for all when he offered himself. For the law appoints men subject to weakness to be high priests, but the word of the oath, which was taken after the law, appoints a son, who has been made perfect forever.

GOSPEL: Mark 12:28b-34

One of the scribes came to Jesus and asked him, "Which is the first of all the commandments?" Jesus replied, "The first is this: Hear, O Israel! The Lord our God is Lord alone! You shall love the Lord your God with all your heart, with all your soul, with all your mind, and with all your strength. The second is this: You shall love your neighbor as yourself. There is no other commandment greater than these." The scribe said to him, "Well said, teacher. You are right in saying, 'He is One and there is no other than he.' And 'to love him with all your heart, with all your understanding, with all your strength, and to love your neighbor as yourself' is worth more than all burnt offerings and sacrifices." And when Jesus saw that he answered with understanding, he said to him, "You are not far from the kingdom of God." And no one dared to ask him any more questions.

ATTENTION THANKSGIVING DAY MASS





Pray for the Souls in Purgatory at the Cemetery St. James Cathedral Basilica

Receive a Plenary Indulgence in November

On the selected Fridays listed, the cemetery at St. James Cathedral Basilica will be open to pray for the deceased in order to receive the November plenary indulgence. This will coincide with the Friday 11:00AM Adoration Holy Hour and will only be open for that time. Devotional candles for the deceased will be available for purchase and envelopes to write your intentions will be provided. The envelopes will be collected and the intentions presented at the altar on the following Sunday.

A plenary indulgence is a grace from the Catholic Church that removes the temporal punishment for sin and it must be accompanied by a complete detachment from sin. In order to be capable of gaining indulgences one must be baptized, not excommunicated, and in the state of grace at least at the completion of the prescribed works. To gain an indulgence, one must have at least the general intention of doing so and must carry out the enjoined works at the stated time and in due fashion, according to the sense of the grant.

To receive the plenary indulgence this November, you must:

* Visit a cemetery

- * Pray for the dead, even if only mentally
- * Detach yourself from all sin, even venial sin

Mezzage from the Man Mozfairz ALL Souls' DAY / EL DIA DE LOS MUERTOS

Yesterday was the Feast of All Souls. At King of Peace Church in South Philadelphia, TWELVE Masses were celebrated starting at 6 a.m. and going until 9 a.m. In other words, one Mass every 15 minutes. Needless to say, being an altar boy on November 2 made for a much-delayed breakfast!

This morning we will honor our beloved dead with the "Pie Jesu" from Faure's Requiem. Historically, Requiems allowed composers to show off their talents by depicting the horrors of the Last Judgment in their setting of the Dies Irae (Day of Wrath). Faure skipped the Dies Irae completely. Instead, he offers a much more peaceful setting of the Funeral Mass.

The text being sung simply translates as: Pious Lord Jesus, grant them rest, eternal rest.
